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

Update from The Front Door

Unity House's new Community Resource Center sees dramatic increase in use of services

Unity House's new home, called The Front Door, is a compassionate gateway for people in need. Offering more than just daytime respite for people who are homeless and others in need, the new and expanded offerings connect people to services in new ways. Services such as case management, housing support services, domestic violence services and employment training are now accessible under one roof to provide comprehensive care – all to improve the lives of people living in poverty or those living with serious challenges. The chart below comparing one month, shows the increase in demand for just some of the available services at The Front Door:

Burke's Blog



When I look back to where we were at this time last year, it is amazing to think about all that has happened since then. Last summer we were in the midst of construction on Unity House's new home, The Front Door, a community resource center for all at 2431 Sixth Avenue in Troy. Our staff were displaced, working in temporary (read: tight) quarters and people who came to Unity House for help were dealing with finding help in different locations. I am happy to say our dedicated staff in the program we called 'Street Ministry' were able to adjust; meeting the needs of consumers and navigating a move to our new home when construction was complete in October 2013.

The Capital Campaign was full-steam ahead, raising dollars as we raised beams. I want to again extend heartfelt thanks to the hundreds of donors who supported our capital campaign and to our capital campaign committee for their dedication to Unity House.

At The Front Door we consolidated many of our human services under one roof. (The Unity Sunshine Program and the Domestic Violence Services Programs remain in their current locations.) One can find at The Front Door, the Bethany Community Meals Program, Housing Support and Mental Health services, our Volunteer Program, and Community Resources. Formerly called 'Street Ministry' from the original Unity House founding in 1971, Community Resources is a program that welcomes all people in need.

Community Resources is the gateway. It is where everyone starts when they walk through the front door. They are greeted warmly in our lobby, and are offered an intake. A family might choose to access our food pantry or shop in our thrift store. A guest might enjoy a meal at Bethany where sometimes as many as 175 people come for breakfast and lunch. Some will talk to staff about housing, sign up for a free course on financial literacy, enjoy an afternoon happening at Bethany or use the computers in our library. Others may need to do laundry or take a shower; they might take advantage of our job coaching and employment referral services. There are many ways people can help themselves at The Front Door, and we are thrilled to see people here every day, using this community resource.

People come to Unity House to fill needs that can't be filled elsewhere. Sometimes they have nowhere else to turn.

Our new home offers the chance to welcome people in need and help them create a plan of action. That is where being at The Front Door has paid off: having programs co-located is not just a cost savings, it's an opportunity to introduce beneficial services in a non-judgmental way. It's a whole lot easier to broach a conversation about housing when a case manager from housing happens to be having lunch at the table next to yours in Bethany. Browsing through clothes at ReStyle where staff and volunteers work makes for a powerful example of how job coaching can start.

One of my favorite things about The Front Door is the integration that has been such a benefit, sometimes in unforeseen ways. We knew we would benefit from the natural symbiosis among programs that comes from being under one roof, but I could not have predicted how nice it would be to see volunteers in action. One of my favorite volunteers is Mary Jane Smith, who can often be seen on the 2nd floor for her volunteer shift at Bethany. Mary Jane was one of the original three founders of Unity House back in 1971 along with Regis Obijiski and the late Peter Callaghan.

To look back at how Unity House has changed and grown over the years is both amazing and humbling. None of the good work that Unity House does and the positive changes we've had as an organization would be possible without the support of countless donors. I'm often reminded that our donors want confirmation that the dollars they entrust do make a difference. I'm glad we now have a home where I can invite donors to see the work we do and to meet the people who are empowered by the help they receive from Unity House through the generosity of others.

If you haven't already, I invite you to visit The Front Door. Come see how you help make life better.

Unity Sunshine Program Gets a Special Visit!

Acting Assistant Secretary for Special Education and Rehabilitative Services at the US Department of Education, Michael Yudin, visited the Albany location of the Unity Sunshine Program in April. Mr. Yudin came to see the fully integrated and inclusive early learning setting for young children with disabilities to learn alongside their typically developing peers. Mr. Yudin met with children and their families and spoke of how critical it is for states and local providers to engage, support and empower families of young children with disabilities. On the U.S. Department of Education's website, where Mr. Yudin blogged about

his visit to Unity Sunshine, he wrote, "While it is imperative that all young children have access to screening and appropriate services, research highlights the need to ensure developmental screening in low-income, racially diverse urban populations, where the risk of delay is greater and access

to services can be more difficult." We are grateful for Mr. Yudin's visit and for highlighting

the need to ensure services for people who have historically been underserved.

The Unity Sunshine Program provides early intervention and pre-school developmental services in speech/language, physical and occupational therapy, psychological consultation

and general skills. The program has four centers- three in Troy and one in downtown Albany- for therapy and educational services. Knowing your child is cared for in a safe, nurturing environment is invaluable to any parent-whether your child has developmental delays or is developing at a typical pace.

Community Resources Serving More at The Front Door

Formerly called Street Ministry, the Community Resources program at Unity House is often the first contact for those seeking help and kindness. The Community Resources program provides emergency food, clothing, housing assistance, crisis intervention, advocacy and referrals to prevent homelessness and to link people to services in the community.

There is a welcoming lobby at the Front Door where guests are greeted and directed. Sometimes it's to the food pantry or for assistance at ReStyle, our thrift store that stocks clothing and household goods. Many times, guests head straight to the second floor, where the Bethany community meals program offers breakfast and lunch daily. Other times, it's referrals to other programs, some within Unity House some with community partners. Often, it's a chance to talk and get direction. This year, we saw many seeking relief for their high utility bills when prices spiked in late winter. Case managers are trained to help consumers complete an application through National Grid's Care and Share program.

With the move to the Front Door, Unity House is able to serve more people, connecting them more easily to a variety of services.



HOW DOES YOUR GARDEN GROW? DO YOU HAVE LEFTOVER PRODUCE FROM YOUR GARDEN?

Thanks to the good work of Capital District Community Gardens, Unity House is once again gardening in a community garden plot. This year, our garden plot is one block away from The Front Door. Every day we encounter people in need who come through our doors completely overwhelmed and struggling to manage their stress. While this has always been the philosophy of Unity House, we are better able to put our mission into everyday practice, thanks to our new building and all the people who made it possible.

Housing Support Services

Unity House offers several housing and case management options so that adults living with mental illness, people with HIV/AIDS, people who are homeless, young adults, individuals with chemical addiction and individuals living with major medical issues can live safely and self sufficiently in the community with dignity and independence.

- Four Community Residences offer a structured, supportive environment for adults living
 with mental illness, with 24/7 staff support. Services foster skill building necessary to
 transition to more independent settings.
- Transitional Apartment Services provides safe, secure furnished apartments for adults living with mental illness. Services are provided through home visits up to 7 days a week, based upon individual needs.
- Supported Housing provides assistance in securing and maintaining safe, permanent housing as well as comprehensive case management services for both adults living with mental illness and those living with HIV/AIDS.
- Community Housing Assistance Program provides comprehensive case management services including assistance in securing and maintaining permanent housing for adults living with mental illness with a history of chronic homelessness.
- Case Management services help young adults who are mentally ill and chemically addicted live independently while they seek treatment.
- Health Home Care Management provides comprehensive case management to individuals who are high users of Medicaid through hospitalizations and ER admissions.

At Sojourner Place, an Infusion of Love that Ripples

How does a teddy bear make its way from the loving arms of a child to the hands of a vulnerable child in need?

Children who come to Sojourner Place, the new Unity House shelter for victims of domestic violence, often arrive with nothing more than the clothes on their back. Thanks to the Bear Hugs Project, they are given a friend upon arrival who offers love and comfort. Diane Ryan, Service Director at Unity House's shelter, told us about the Bear Hugs Project and we had to learn more.

The Bear Hugs Project is part of "Bridging People and Places", founded by Hollie Vanderzee in 2000. A small, not-for-profit group with no paid staff and a big heart, the group's mission is to connect those willing to volunteer their time with programs designed to bring comfort to others during difficult times. They believe that such service should have value for both the giver and the receiver. And boy, do they deliver!

Now headed by Lorraine Thompson, The Bear Hugs Project sends a gift of a teddy bear infused with love to children in challenging situations, such as serious illness, having a parent in hospice, or living in a shelter due to homelessness or domestic violence.

Where do the teddy bears come from and how do they get to Sojourner Place? That's where the children of Tamarack Elementary play a role. Teacher Sanada Bailey works with children in grades pre-K through second to help with the Bear Hugs Project. You see, it's not just a drive to collect teddy bears and send them out. Instead, the program teaches children the value of caring and sharing through volunteering. Helping the Bear Hugs Project provides an opportunity for children to build self- esteem and develop leadership skills working on a worthwhile service project that has a direct impact on other youth. The Bear Hugs Project recognizes that for children, learning they are part of something larger than themselves, is an important part of service learning.

The Bear Hugs Project makes the giving of a teddy bear an act of kindness that sends love and support to the recipient. It's about process as much as form.

Bridging People and Places brings bears to the school on what is fondly called, "Bear Day." Children choose a bear, determine the bear's gender and then pick a hand knit outfit and hat for the bear. Then the child hugs the bear, effectively infusing the bear with love and kindness through a bear hug. Bears are then packed up for volunteer Ginny Hanby to deliver to places like Sojourner Place and the Double H Ranch, a summer camp for children facing life-threatening illness. The dens often feature positive messages written by the children.

As Bridging People and Places explains it, "Our programs send positive messages of loving kindness; promote healing; and bring more sensitivity, cooperation, and compassion into our world."

Judging by the smiles on the faces of children at Sojourner Place who receive a teddy bear through the Bear Hugs Program, we can attest to the love, warmth and kindness the bears bring to vulnerable children at Sojourner Place.
