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Uncertainty Calls for Action

Winter is often a time of reflection. It's when we plan ahead for Spring, a time of renewal. At Unity House we reflected on projects to best serve the needs of people who come

to us struggling and hurting. Like many non-profit organizations, we have been forced by the changing national landscape to question what it will take to reach the goals we've been working toward these many years. How will we handle an increase in the numbers of people struggling to attain life's essentials such as food, housing, clothing, jobs, and care for their children?

These questions and more make me grateful for the staff, friends, and partners of Unity House. Our Board of Directors works to keep Unity House on a path of fiscal responsibility so we can be agile in times of uncertainty. Our partnerships with local organizations help us all better serve our consumers. Our volunteers are vital to the mission of Unity House, helping us ensure fidelity to our core values: that everyone deserves equal economic, political, and social rights. We work together to open the doors of access and opportunity for everyone, particularly those in greatest need.

Certainly Unity House is not alone in planning for the possibility of decreased government support while demand for services increases locally. Part of our strategic planning is to continue to work with fellow agencies and groups who help us maximize efficiencies while delivering needed services with dignity. But I worry it won't be enough. Enough to ensure that families threatened by eviction have a place to go. Enough to ensure our

food pantry is stocked for those who are forced to pay rent or buy medicine before groceries. Enough to offer help in obtaining SNAP benefits, commonly known as food stamps.

Will there be further cuts to food programs, we wonder. We see job seekers who come looking for help in finding employment, or enough employment, to meet their basic needs. We see parents seeking help for their toddler diagnosed with a developmental delay. We meet victims of domestic violence who are in crisis, and adults living with conditions such as persistent mental illness or HIV/AIDS, or those challenged by chronic homelessness. Trying to help people meet their needs in a challenging time is both heartwarming and heartbreaking work.

Your support of this work is crucial. Together, we can help people bridge the gap between helplessness and self-sufficiency, between panic and security. If you haven't already, I urge you to get involved. Consider a donation to the Unity House program that speaks to you, come and volunteer, or help us to advocate for people in need.

As Spring arrives, we see beauty all around us. At Unity House, I am grateful for the goodness I see in people helping each other. In whatever way you are a part of this work, thank you.

Our community lost two beloved figures: Mary Jane Smith and Dean Leith.

Mary Jane Smith, a founder of Unity House, passed away in January at the age of 87. We learned of her passing on Martin Luther King Day. It seemed fitting for a woman who was dedicated to social justice and had a tremendous impact over the course of her life. You can read more on our website about Mary Jane Smith, her role in founding Unity House in 1971 with Regis Obijiski and the late Peter Callaghan, and her life of advocacy for people in need.

The other loss was that of Dean Leith, who passed away at the age of 84. Dean was an early volunteer and board member to Unity House who was seminal in founding what is now known as Capital Roots. What started as a service project spun out of Dean's work at Garden Way (formerly Troy-Bilt Rototiller Co.), is now a network of community gardens in three counties with Troy's Urban Grow Center committed to food justice. Unity House proudly partners with our neighbor Capital Roots.

We take inspiration from Dean's and Mary Jane's lives well-lived and we work to honor the legacy they each leave. We are grateful for the many people who shared their wonderful memories of those who helped shape Unity House. News from our Community Resources Program

Food insecurity, when an individual or a family does not have consistent access to adequate food due to a lack of money and other resources, is what prompts many to come to Unity House.

If you are struggling to pay the rent or weren't counting on such a long heating season, the grocery budget gets whittled down. It means people can't get enough food or they can't get enough quality food. Compounding matters, some have chronic medical issues, making access to quality, nutrient-dense food all the more important.

For families facing food insecurity, a community meal, food pantry, and food backpack program can be lifelines. In addition, food programs often serve as a gateway to other needed services, such as screening a child for developmental

delays, help escaping an abusive partner, housing support and case management services for mental illness, clothing from our store ReStyle, job coaching for help finding a job – or a better job,

one that might pay closer to a living wage.

It can be overwhelming when we see upwards of 100 diners ready for lunch at Unity House. It's daunting when our food pantry shelves are not as flush as we'd hope, especially toward monthend when needs increase. It's a tremendous undertaking, but with your support we can help meet the basic needs of the men, women, and children who come to Unity House for one of life's essentials. What's a Food Backpack Program? It's the mountain on the move.

Staff who are trained in providing traumainformed services go out into the community with backpacks of food and other sundries for those in need.
