With passion and integrity, Unity House embraces the view that everyone deserves equal economic, political, and social rights. We work together to open doors of access and opportunity for everyone, particularly those in greatest need.

We'll call her Stella.

but her name could just as easily be Annemarie or Yvette. Stella's story is worth sharing. It will break your heart, but also restore your faith.

Stella is a grandmother who found herself taking in her grandchildren after they were removed from their home. Stella was overwhelmed with the needs of her young grandkids, not only with the demands on her time, but with the physical needs of the children. She came to Unity House where she was able to sit down with an intake staffer at our community resource center. Together, they were able to assess what would best serve Stella and the children. Immediately, Stella was able to pick out groceries for her household and bring home hot meals for her and the children.

> Our staff are trained in providing trauma-informed care. Our front-line workers were able to convince Stella to apply for

SNAP benefits, commonly known as food stamps. Stella was reluctant to apply, thinking these benefits are only for those with a greater need. But staff patiently explained to Stella how she had worked all of her adult life, paying into a system that is designed to offer a safety net for those who may need it at times. Stella applied for needed benefits and has a follow up appointment to speak with our dedicated coordinator who has expertise in SNAP benefits. She'll help Stella track the status of her application and navigate her options. Stella left Unity House with not just food but also with hope.

That one meeting didn't solve everything. For Stella, coming to Unity House was an important step, if only to prevent greater crisis. People like Stella who face food insecurity are often forced to make painful spending trade-offs such as pay the rent or fill the fridge. These choices can lead to a cascade of consequences, sometimes resulting in eviction. For now, Stella and her children are housed, clothed, and fed.

Stella will be back, with her grandchildren in tow to get clothes and shoes from the Unity House store, for which she was given a gift card. In this way, Stella and the children have the dignity of choice. They are not simply handed a bag of clothing, they can pick out what suits them best. They don't get a box of food or toiletries, they are able to choose what works for them. In this way, Stella and her children experience having their needs met in an affirming way.

You, our supporters, volunteers, and donors, are what make this valuable work possible. Please know how much your support means, to Stella, her grandchildren and the many others who walk through our doors. You are helping to bridge the gap between panic and security. Inside our new site at 6 102nd Street*, next to the Family Dollar store Violence in Lansingburgh, our domestic violence services team offers valuable services to survivors of domestic violence. Outside, the team engages in community work to address the epidemic of violence, especially among youth. Partnering with SNUG, a group working with those at greatest risk of harm from gun violence, staff offer direct outreach. Community violence demands a collaborative, community response. The new site offers great public spaces, which staff and volunteers are busy greening, offering not only street beautification, but a proven public safety measure. Board Member Spotlight

Advocates in Action: Kate Koval

Kathryn Allen, also a steadfast supporter and seen here on the left, who introduced Kate, at right, to the idea of service. Kate started out volunteering on a Unity House event committee. As she learned about the work of human services, she got more involved; eventually Kate stepped up to join the Unity House board of directors, which she now leads. Kate credits Kathryn as her mentor, for encouraging her to give back and to do so in a meaningful way.

For Kate, of particular resonance are the needs of people experiencing homelessness and food insecurity. Unity House's Community Resources program is often the first point of contact for people who need help with life's essentials such as housing, food, and clothing. Of the many people served by Unity House annually, a majority find help through Community Resources. Often, people come in crisis; staff work to address immediate needs and then work together with them towards stability.

When asked what advice she would give someone considering volunteer service, Kate encourages people to look far and wide. "Try different things, at different organizations, and you'll find something that speaks to you. At Unity House, for people who want to get involved, there is something for everyone because Unity House offers so many different services."

For some, it's justice for survivors of domestic violence that strikes a chord, or housing for the vulnerable. For others, it might be helping children with developmental delays, working



to help people overcome barriers to employment, or addressing food insecurity. All volunteers can be sure of one thing: the positive impact they make.

Kate would be the first to tell you that volunteering changes the giver as much as the receiver, "I have learned so much over the years. I see how the disparities in our own community can seem overwhelming. But everyone has something to give. It all comes down to giving back, to make life better, right here, in the communities where we live and work."

Volunteers are vital to the fulfillment of the Unity House vision of serving and empowering people in need. Not all volunteers lend as much time as Kate does in leading the Unity House board of directors, but all volunteers can be certain of one thing: they make a difference.
